"Lord, teach us to pray" (Luke 11:1) Prayer by Heart

Knowing a prayer or Bible passage "by heart" has more than one meaning. It means we can repeat these words from memory — without looking at a text. It also means these words have sunk deeply into our hearts. The metaphor of our heart draws on the ancient understanding of that being the seat of our intelligence, memory, emotion, and will.

There are prayers and Bible passages that we can repeat until they become part of the fabric of our lives. They are words we use at the most solemn and the most

vulnerable times in life. They are like well-worn pebbles, polished by the passage of time, used repeatedly at deep moments in our life.

I encourage you to have by heart the Lord's Prayer, the Hail Mary, the Collect for Purity, some other prayers that are special for you, and some favourite Bible passages, especially psalms and psalm portions.

The O Antiphons

Today we sing "O Come, O come, Emmanuel!..." In Daily Prayer, before and after psalms and canticles, there is usually an antiphon which changes with the Church Season or celebration.

From at least the eighth century at Evening Prayer, for the seven days leading up to Christmas Eve, the antiphon with the Magnificat ("My soul magnifies the Lord..." Luke 1:46-55) has greeted Christ with a title starting with "O". These became the basis of "O come, O come, Emmanuel". The initials, when read backwards, form the Latin "Ero Cras" which means "Tomorrow I come." There is much more on my website (liturgy.co.nz) about these wonderful Advent O Antiphons. First Reading: (sit) Isaiah 35: 1-10 Sue Shannons

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God.

Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. Say to those who are of a fearful heart, 'Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you.'

Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes.

Gospel: Matthew 11: 2-11 Fr Peter Williams

When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by is disciples and said to Jesus, 'Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?' Jesus answered them, 'Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is anyone who takes no offence at me.' As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written,

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you." Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.
