

From the Vicar...

Dear Friends,

As we come to the end of the calendar year, we have begun a new Church year in December and the Season of Advent. Advent has changed a lot in the past decades as Christmas has become a part of popular culture and the commercialised world. It is almost impossible not to be swept up in 'the silly season' as one attends work Christmas parties, lights and decorations spring up, and carols are echoed through the shopping malls.

As Christians it can often seem like we are living in between two worlds. On one hand our Advent Sunday readings focus on John the Baptist and the second coming of Christ, and on the other, we are beginning to sing carols and take part in Nativity plays. Though this may be strange, it is in fact quite normal for Christians, for we are in a sense always living between two worlds.

We are a pilgrim people, always on that journey towards God and the fullness of Christ. But we are also people of this world, it is our home which we are called to care for and be intimately involved with. Being a pilgrim people allows us to integrate ourselves with these two worlds. To participate in the festivities of December but also to focus our attention on the narrative of Advent that leads us to Christmas. For our God is a pilgrim God who calls us to pilgrimage in this world and the next.

As we gather for this great feast of Christmas once again, we become even more aware of this idea of pilgrimage. For God reveals to us his nature as a pilgrim in the fact that he stoops down and becomes one of us, and participates in our pilgrimage on earth towards that greater destination of the life to come. This is Good News. As we celebrate once more God's coming among us at Christmas, I hope and pray that Christ our infant saviour may give you the joy of the Bethlehem shepherds, the awe of the worshipping sages and the humility and love of the holy family.

The Birth of Christ: Luke 2: 1–20 Fr Robert Jamieson

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David.

He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child.

And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth and laid him in a manger, because there was no place in the guest room.

Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for see, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!"

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child, and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them, and Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, just as it had been told them.

Gospel: John 1:1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overtake it.

There was a man sent from God whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him, yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him.

But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

This is the Gospel of Christ. **Praise to Christ the Word.**

Affirmation of Faith: (stand)
