The First Sunday of Advent 30 November 2025

From the Vicar...

Dear friends,

It is that time again when we can greet each other with Happy New (liturgical) Year! And so, greetings on this first Sunday of Advent and the beginning of another Church year. Despite all that is happening around us Advent is in fact a season of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming (adventus) of Christ in his incarnation, and also looks ahead to his final advent as judge at the end of time.

It cannot be determined with any degree of certainty when the celebration of Advent was first introduced into the Church. The preparation for the feast of the Nativity of Our Lord was not held before the feast itself existed, and of this we find no evidence before the end of the fourth century, when, according to Duchesne [Christian Worship (London, 1904), 260], it was celebrated throughout the whole Church, by some on 25 December, by others on 6 January. Of such a preparation we read in the Acts of a synod held at Saragossa in 380, whose fourth canon prescribes that from the seventeenth of December to the feast of the Epiphany no one should be permitted to absent themselves from church (take note!).

The readings and liturgies of Advent not only direct us towards Christ's birth; they also challenge the modern reluctance to confront the theme of divine judgement present in the scriptures:

The Four Last Things – Death, Judgement, Heaven and Hell – have been traditional 'themes' for Advent meditation, mainly springing from the selected readings for each Sunday of Advent. The characteristic note of Advent is therefore expectation, rather than penitence, although the character of the season is easily coloured by an analogy with Lent.

The anticipation of Christmas under commercial pressure has also made it harder to sustain the appropriate sense of alert watchfulness, but the fundamental Advent prayer remains 'Maranatha' – 'Our Lord, come' (1 Corinthians 16.22). Church decorations are sometimes simple and spare, and purple is the traditional liturgical colour. We 'fast' from the Gloria so that we might join the Angels in ever more joyful praise on Christmas Eve and proclaim 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'

In the northern hemisphere, the Advent season falls at the darkest time of the year, in the southern hemisphere it is in reverse, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are seen through a different lens throughout Advent and Christmas. The lighting of candles on an Advent wreath was imported into Britain from northern Europe in the nineteenth century and was quickly adopted by many churches, now becoming common practice. I hope that through this Season of watchfulness the spirit of God will be at work in us all, preparing our hearts to welcome the Christ Child in our midst.

Gospel: Matthew 24:36-44 Fr Jordan Greatbatch "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as in the days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so, too, will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken, and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken, and one will be left. Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.
